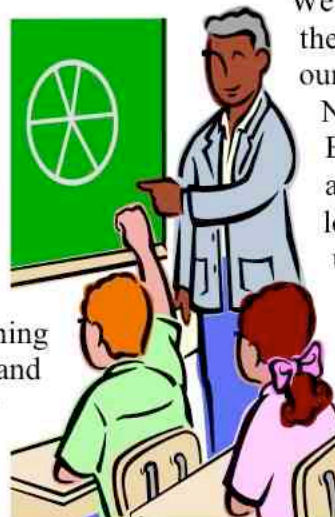

Nursery Times

Corrine Burgler a volunteer from Holland, has been hard at work designing an education based nursery to meet the needs of our youngest BSD students.

Upon arriving, 11 November, Corrine had planned to work with children individually utilizing her Speech Training background, but quickly noted that Speech Training was not a part of the curriculum observed at the school.

Director Aloy Bibum values the Deaf environment that BSD embodies and encourages all to learn and use Sign Language.

With that in mind, Burgler concluded that her priorities and skills would be best applied to the development of a Nursery Programme. "My initial goal was to teach and after observing for a month I came to recognize the dire need for a proper nursery," she stated. After coming to this conclusion Burgler desired to establish a Nursery programme, which would first, include a proper space for teaching, playing and

learning and second, an age appropriate curriculum.

Burgler has combined her experience in the schools and her Speech Training Degree to develop the Teaching Manuel while utilizing her creative sense to construct a proper learning space. "You see, space here at BSD is very limited and the nursery age children were placed in the dinning area, which is an active space," she noted. "I observed the children being easily distracted with people passing



through and came to the conclusion that we needed a curtain of some sort." Burgler along with the weekend staff hung a curtain to divide the large space and create a sense of privacy, which has made for a warm teaching area that lends itself to easily distracted eyes.

Burgler also noted that the space was bare and did not reflect a child's enthusiasm. Children from a young age need to be visually stimulated, she remarked, and the room did not have any color or visual affects.

Burgler spent the weekend of the 13th and 14th, with the help of some staffers, at the market and

setting up the room for a new start on Monday the 15th. "I am pleased with the physical improvements, but I am eager to start training the Nursery teacher on curriculum next week," Burgler stated.

When asked about her experience with curriculum development she explained, "This was my first time mapping out teaching curriculum for an entire term. It took a lot of time, patience

and creativity."

Her initiative, creativity, experience in Holland and numerous

hours of research on the Internet have enabled her to create curriculum accompanied by a Teaching Manuel for the School to build upon. Head of Instruction, Margaret Bibum exclaims, "Corrine has put a lot of herself into this project and the outcome of her efforts can be seen in the eyes of the children." Bibum looks forward to implementing the curriculum.

BSD is pleased to have Burgler's creative mind and caring heart till 9th of March. Her goals to accomplish before she leaves:

While class 6 is motivated to learn the daily lessons of Okumo, they are also preparing for the national exam, First School Leaving Certificate (FSLC) administered at the conclusion of their primary education. Okumo is confident that her students will do well in most subjects. She acknowledges

vocabulary on the test." As a teacher, Okumo continued, I want them to do well. They have been my students since September and I want to see them all succeed. Okumo went on to explain, "I teach because I love children. I come from a big family and I have always worked well with young people."

When asked about teaching at a Deaf School she remarked, "I have a special feeling for the Deaf. They have a right to earn an education and they need people like myself and the other teachers who have interest in teaching."
